They combined their unique talents, knowledge, skills, and experiences to address the pressing issues that the communities were facing. Gram Chetna Kendra began its formal operations from the village of Khedi Milak, located 55 km from Jaipur, the capital of Rajasthan, in the Sambhar Block of Jaipur District.

The association started its activities in two villages from the Sambhar Lake area, to extend and reach 11 districts in Rajasthan. Currently, Gram Chetna Kendra is working specifically in 2 districts (Jaipur and Dausa).

We aim to see empowered rural people in our project areas address the issues of their own development and participate actively and collectively in the well-being of the community. We work specifically with the most underprivileged segments of society, especially women, children, and people with disabilities, and we would like to initiate change in the community so as to protect their rights, enhance their access to education and equal opportunities and make them actors of their own empowerment.





LIVELIHOOD



Building Sustainable livelihood in animal husbandry for marginalized women in Sambar lake, Jaipur District, Rajasthan

ACTIVITY

- Conducted training programs for women's access to different government schemes
- Baseline Survey
- Regular community meetings
- Quarterly meetings with dairy companies and milk unions and exchanges between SHG members and selected dairy companies' representatives
- Networking meetings with the animal husbandry departments
- Support for FMD vaccination campaign
- Formation and monthly meetings of SHGs
- Identification of beneficiaries and facilitation of access to loans in order to purchase animals
- Linkages with different dairies and government schemes.

ACHIEVEMENTS

- Women beneficiaries are aware about the different schemes and the vaccination campaigns. Tagging of animals has been realized through the support of the animal husbandry department Beneficiaries were identified through the baseline survey, they received loans through different banks and purchased animals.
- Owe have raised Rs. 1,75,48,500 as a bank loan to purchase livestock including 156 Cows and 272 Buffalo's and as of now 429 women has been linked to dairy.
- A total of 19 SHGs have been formed, with 263 representatives.
- 553 beneficiaries were linked with different dairies. Beneficiaries are receiving 7-day payment through the bank from the dairies.
- A baseline survey was conducted with 594 families in the project villages.



MAA ANNAPURNA MASALA

The project aims to empower the most marginalized and vulnerable women in rural areas (widows, disabled, single, economically disadvantaged, ST, SC, OBC) by boosting their income and social inclusion through sustainable and secure employment. The purpose is to help women gain financial stability so that they can cover necessary expenses for their own and their children's well-being.

AGRICULTURE

ENHANCING WATER ACCESS AND WATER CONSERVATION THROUGH AGROFORESTRY AND INTEGRATED AGRICULTURE TO IMPROVE THE LIVELIHOOD OF WOMEN FARMERS



The project will take place in 15 villages and 7 Gram Panchayats of Sambhar Block, Jaipur District, Rajasthan. As per 2011 census data, the total population in the 15 villages is of 23802 people, including 12221 men and 11581 women, for 3816 households. An important share of the households belongs to the BPL category.

- Training on horticulture and orchard Management
- Training conducted on WASH, water saving best practices and the importance of biodiversity

- Provision of 420 vermicompost pits and worms

ACHIEVEMENTS

- 37500 fruits and 37500 Khejri plants have distributed among 420 women households. (each beneficiary received 30 fruits trees and 30 Khejri trees)
- Enhancement of production, conservation of resources, market led farming, value addition and improving supply chain
- 750 women are part of SHGs and start to do monthly savings.
- 420 women families shift to organic farming through the use of vermicompost
- 200 women become master trainers on vermicompost making and orchard management and they are able to spread the knowledge to 650 women in their own villages
- 750 women are empowered through participation to the Self-Help Groups and are linked to the existing Women Federation/ Farmers Producers' Organization
- 75 families (around 450 people) receive free and harmful contents-free drinking water.
- Demonstration model for capacity building of women farmers for execution of other projects

Objectives- To Provide Preventive and curative health services to the target population of urban slums by improving and strengthening the available healthcare & ICDS services, To improve counselling and referral services through health camps, To promote good health practices and positive health seeking behaviours amongst the target population through social behavioural change and communication (SBCC) in the community, Create awareness on ANC & PNC, prevention on health issues, communicable disease, nutrition and food practices.

Harnessing Fruit Tree Diversity as a Nature-Based Solution for Food Security, Nutrition, Human and Planetary Health in India

INTRODUCTION:

The CFL project is an ongoing project initiated in the month of July 2022 by Gram Chetna Kendra in 7 villages of Sambhar Lake Block of Rajasthan. These villages come under semi-arid climatic region where agriculture depends on rain. In this region fruit plants has not been growing due to lack of water availability, soil erosion. Through this project GCK is campaigning to popularize fruit production and consumption in the context of preventing malnutrition among communities, and also focusing awareness among school children. This project will be helpful for the community and farmers in the study area who will learn climate resilience fruit plantation that will provide economic support as well as supplement nutrition. GCK from the very initial phase in collaboration with Agriculture University, Johner identified progressive farmers and provided fruit plants to women farmers. Support to biodiversity is an important aspect which is expected in the study area and it will promote local vegetation as well. We also look forward that the number of plants in few years will be helpful to increase water level as well and fruits will ripe and local communities consume this fruits.


